With the onset of the cold weather here are some tips from your School Nurse.

Dressing properly is very important. Children should not be coming to school without coats, hats and gloves when the weather is cold. Even if you drop them off or the school bus picks them up; they still need to wear appropriate outerwear. As long as the weather is 26 degrees or above students will go out for lunchtime recess.

The arrival of cold weather brings with it increased cases of illnesses especially influenza, pneumonia, bronchitis and other serious and contagious childhood illnesses. The best way to reduce the spread of these illnesses is to follow the tips that are listed below:

> Please stress the importance of proper hand washing. Children should not be sent to school if they have a fever or have been vomiting Excessive cough, complaint of sore throat, headache, muscular aches or pains are all signs of illness. The student who is not feeling well cannot benefit from instruction and will be the cause of spreading infection to others. We also can never forget the importance of getting a flu vaccine before the winter.

Hope these tips help our students here at Sargent stay healthy this winter.
