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Sargent ES **Supports Pride**

Students at Sargent Elementary School celebrated Pride Month this June culminating a yearlong effort to celebrate marginalized groups, including LGBTQ + people, and to create an affirming environment for students.

Director of Facilities Jesse Morrill noted that while there are unexpected circumstances in construction, he predicts the work will be completed right on time. "We're adapting and we're getting through it," Morrill said. "There's going to plenty for the staff and students to see when school opens."

The next phase of the tax neutral project, where residents' taxes do not rise, will involve renovating Rombout's and BHS' science classrooms, constructing a new library at Sargent and installing double doors at Glenham for security purposes. Bids for this phase will be sent out to vendors in September and work is expected to start next summer.

"Next summer is going to be action packed," Quartironi said. "We're very excited about doing all of the projects."



What started with just a few fidget spinners in Special Education teacher Mike Werba's classroom at Glenham Elementary School has slowly grown into a mini empire with him making multiple 3D printed cupcakes and figurines of Baby Yoda, just to name a few.



Werba's initial intention was to make fidget spinners and stress balls that help satisfy students' sensory needs and increase their focus in classes. The items are designed on a laptop, with input from Werba's students, before they go to print.

'We don't have to worry about going to a box in someone's classroom; I can create it real quick," Werba said. "What I'm trying to create is a therapeutic setting, but giving them access to the electronics.

All of the 3D printed items are composed of Polylactic acid, a plant based plastic that is biodegradable and recyclable, making this a good activity for the earth.

"It's not like I'm throwing a bunch of plastic into the air," Werba said. "It's even better that we're using material that's reusable and it breaks down.

While Werba has not charged teachers for the printed items, he did create 100 tigers, the school's mascot, for a fundraising effort with all donations going to Sparrow's Nest. The fan base for Werba's creations has quickly grown districtwide with frequent requests coming in.

"I created it for all the service providers and basically opened it up to the school,' Werba explained. "They made their way across the school and now they're going across the district.



NCA CHEERLEADER Camp Makes a Comeback



Beacon students shook their pom-poms and showed their school spirit during the first annual two-day National Cheerleaders Association camp, held between July 24 and 25 at South Avenue.

The camp, open to incoming freshmen, sophomores and seniors, was started with the intention to potentially start a cheerleading competition program during the school year, which BHS has not had in years. This competition cheerleading team would involve students creating specific routines that could be judged at the Section IX and state levels.



"It's one of our long term goals," Varsity Cheerleading Coach Andonia Karnavezos said.

Karnavezos led the camp and former cheerleading Coach Jennifer Soltish assisted in getting the camp started. Over the two nine hour days, students went over conditioning and jumping drills and learned new cheers and dance routines. The coach praised her students for giving their best effort.
