#### Beacon Educators Become Lifeguards

Five educators across the Beacon City School District are ready to dive into the Beacon High School pool if someone needs saving as they are now certified lifeguards.

Kelley Bender, Jane Cervone, Becky Shuk, Alex Callaway, and Daniele Reilly were the educators who took the training in the which included knowing when to perform different rescues.

Glenham Elementary School Physical Education teacher Michelle Green has been a lifeguard instructor since 2008 and was initially approached by two teachers who wanted to become certified lifeguards.

Having more people, especially staff members, know emergency water procedures is beneficial and Green hopes more teachers will be interested in getting certified next school year.

"I figured with the national lifeguard shortage, it'd be a great way to recruit staff for the Beacon High School pool," Green said. "When these teachers' classes swim, we will now have extra eyes on and in the water which makes for a safer environment."

Conference Educates about Unhealthy Relationships

Representatives form the Grace Smith House came to Beacon High School on April 24 to discuss the signs of both healthy and abusive romantic relationships during the **"Love Shouldn't Hurt"** conference.

The conference, hosted by Grace Smith outreach Advocate Amanda Greenfield and the

Students Against Destructive Decisions club, was held in the school's LGI room during National Crime Victims' Rights Week.

"Victims of dating abuse can be victims of crime," Greenfield said. "Those issues can happen to anyone, across any identity."

Students watched a 45-minute film centered on a woman's relationship with a man that becomes abusive over time, ending with a slideshow of real women who were killed by abusive

partners. They were then asked to write down and share their reflections about it.



"This is going to really help us understand, recognize and talk about the early warning signs of relationship abuse and how to help a friend," Greenfield said. "We all deserve to be in healthy relationships."

Some of the red flags students and other Grace Smith representatives pointed out from the film included a relationship moving too quickly, constantly wanting to know where the other

person is and stalking them outside of their class. Greenfield noted that abuse in a relationship typically escalates later on.

"Abuse in abusive relationships doesn't happen right away," Greenfield said. "Some of these behaviors that we saw, they can happen so often in a relationship that we think they're normal."

Senior Kaylee Broas thought the conference was important to have and noted that many of the red flags discussed are similar in both romantic and family relationships. "When you're being treated badly by somebody, you're not necessarily going to realize it right away," Broas said. "It's an important thing to focus on."
