July in South River, New Jersey, while first grade teacher Kaitlyn Perlongo and fourth grade special education teacher Nicole Piqueras attended a core training.

This evidence-based approach to teaching and discipline focuses on engaging academics, positive community and developmental awareness.

"Implementing Responsive Classroom over the past couple of years has been so effective and rewarding for my students," Winchell said. "I am so excited to implement even more strategies."

Spirit of Beacon Day Parade



"The kids need to know why things we are doing in the classroom are important to the structure of our day," Silverman explained. "Using what we learned about Teacher Student Language also shows our students how to be respectful, clear and hopefully, independent problem solvers."

The Girls in Sports Day event for 2023 promises to be a valuable resource for prospective athletes, from 3rd - 8th grade.

The September 23rd event, which is celebrating its fourth year, will have female students meet at Beacon High School with various girls Junior Varsity and Varsity coaches to

learn about various sports and how to play them with the hope of exposing potential future athletes to early coaching. Practice starts at 9 am.

"The initiative for this event really came from seeing how low enrollment was for Junior Varsity back in 2018," event organizer Cathryn Biordi explained.

"With the implementation of this program, we really believe that we've overcome that hurdle."

The benefits of girls playing sports are numerous and include higher body esteem and self-confidence, being better at setting priorities and developing leadership skills, according to the Children's Medical Group.

Last year's guest speaker, BHS alum and college basketball player Lauren Schetter, noted that the event is beneficial for students to find out which sports they are passionate about early on. She went from sport to sport, until she eventually found one she had loved.

"If I stuck with soccer I would have never known I had a passion for basketball," Schetter said. "If you want to figure out what your passion is, today is a great day to figure out which sport it is."
