#### **BHS Receives State** Sports Recognition



Beacon High School was named the 2024 recipient of the New York State Public High School Athletic Association's (NYSPHSAA)

Sportsmanship Promotion Award.

The award is given based on a survey that helps athletic departments evaluate their policies and procedures for promoting good sportsmanship which include modeling appropriate behavior and addressing issues before they escalate. "It's nice to see the state recognizing the efforts that we've been putting in collectively as a district," athletic director John Giametta said.

Over the years, Giametta and other administrators have made sure large sporting events are properly staffed and multiple security measures are present to create a pleasant and safe atmosphere for both athletes and visitors.

"It works hand in hand; if you create that positive atmosphere it typically results in positive behavior from everyone," Giametta said. "We couldn't do anything in the athletic department without the support of everybody around us."

While the recognition is nice, Giametta and his department will not rest on their laurels. They continue to find ways to improve as policies and procedures are updated.

"It's a continuous effort," Giametta said. "We keep reflecting on how our events are run and how we can make it better and more enjoyable."

All Beacon **Before-Care** elementary schools now offer before care for parents to drop their children off before school starts every day.

> It is the first year this service has been offered and the district partnered with the Healthy Kids Programs to make it a reality. Parents can drop off their children as

early as 7 am where they can play or do their homework and have a snack under the watchful eye of local parents, who are more than familiar with Beacon.

"It's great because it's our own community members who are running the program," Glenham Principal Cassandra Orser said. "This is something that we've been trying to get into the buildings for a long time."



Orser noted that there have been inquiries from parents for a program like this. Now parents can drop their children off at

school making it more convenient than dropping them off at a daycare and having a bus picking them up from there.

"They don't need to worry about the multiple transports," Orser said of parents. "Having the before school program has been helpful for the community."

During a Sept. 20 session at Glenham, first grader Molly had a blast building a house made with magnetic tiles and using Play Doh, but counted playing the board game Trouble with facilitator Carolyn as her favorite part.

"I like this program," Molly said.

# **Beacon Administrator Co-Leads Crucial Forums**

Six forums focusing on potential future graduation requirements in New York, geared toward educators and the public, began this September and are co-facilitated by a familiar face from Beacon.

The district's Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Student Support Dr. Sagrario Rudecindo-O'Neil was part of the Blue Ribbon Commission which is proposing these transformations:

- Adopting the New York State Portrait of a Graduate.
- Phasing out diploma assessment requirements by eliminating the need to pass the Regents exams or a +1 Pathway assessment to graduate.
- Redefining credits by adding career and technical education and financial literacy requirements.
- Moving to one diploma statewide with advanced designations.
- Requiring all state teacher preparation programs to provide instruction in culturally responsive-sustaining education practices.

Rudecindo-O'Neill applied to be part of the commission and said she was selected because of her work around equity and inclusion and being a bilingual educator. She noted that the commission's work started after a 2019 "On Board" newspaper article where Dr. Betty A. Rosa, Commissioner of Education & President of the University of the State of New York, noted that students of color and those from economically disadvantaged backgrounds had barriers preventing them from graduating, and is seeking ways to make graduation requirements more equitable.

"The number one thing that was important to me is that we decouple the Regents from the graduation requirements," Rudecindo-O'Neill said. "Ninety percent of the commission agreed."

The Assistant Superintendent considers it an honor to have been a part of this process to help remove barriers for students and represent Beacon on such a level. She noted that any feedback families and educators has been welcomed.

"That's going to help with an implementation plan," Rudecindo-O'Neill said of the feedback. "It was a dream come true to be a true agent of change; it was one of the reasons I went into education."

Since last school year, Sargent students and staff have embraced a curriculum known as the Positivity Project, designed to improve relationships between people, and it's proven to be successful, so much so that its higher ups have taken notice.



Positivity Project CEO and co-founder Jeff Bryan visited Sargent in September to meet with students exhibiting 24 character traits the organization came up with. When Bryan visited classes with Principal Cathryn Biordi, students shared when they have used the traits. Some thought of perseverance when they had to complete tough math lessons.

Bryan was impressed to see his creation used effectively at Sargent where students are excited to share about and learn new character strengths. The goal of the project is not to ignore negativity, but to use the character strengths to overcome adversity.

"The kids are happy; they're talking about character strengths and they know their character strengths," Bryan recalled. "It was great to be here."


The theme of this year's day was "Unity in the Community" and that message seemed to resonate as students and their families, as well as staff came together showcasing colorful banners with their respective school's name.
