"It's encouraging to know that some

young people are interested," Atkinson said. "That's really commendable."

"There's a lot of information that I would have never known if I had never volunteered here," Lopez said. "It helps the community and it helps you because it brings personal fulfillment."

Marcus' mother volunteers at the society, so it was only natural he would volunteer there too. He is engaged in a project where he



walks down every Beacon street to discover historical places.

"Just seeing things, you can discover so much about the history," Marcus said. "If I'm going to call someplace my hometown, I feel like I should know a lot about it."

Lapis praised the students for bringing enthusiasm to the role, being good listeners and having superb organization skills, which comes in handy since artifacts and documents have to be properly stored.

Over the course of the program, which ran from late July to mid-August, students worked with district English language learners teachers Nicole Piacente and Elena Kwoka on literacy and language acquisition as well as in-class projects such as "All About Me," where students learned how to do self-portraits and write their own autobiography.

"The purpose of this program is to provide the students additional support in academic language and literacy while making connections to and through the arts and community," Title III ENL coordinator Crystal Sessoms-Wiggins said. "We developed some interesting projects with the students' help and through an exciting collaboration with Dia Beacon art educators."



Dia Beacon assigned artist educator Ana Maria Farina to assist with the program. Dia's relationship with the district goes back to 2001 with the introduction of the Arts Education Program. All of these efforts culminated in a show of the students' works at the museum Augugust 15 which families were invited to see.

Beacon Athletics is sponsoring the fifth annual Girl's In Sports Day on Sept. 28 at Beacon High School (BHS) where all girls from grades three through eight are encouraged to attend.

Starting at 9 a.m., the girls can participate in swimming, basketball, softball, golf, cheerleading, soccer, volleyball and tennis, culminating with a varsity girls soccer home game that everyone is invited to attend. "There's not a lot of other places where you can hone that, aside from sports," Biordi said of sports' communicative benefits. "We just want them to learn in a low stakes environment and have a little fun."
